Mountain Men

Jedediah Strong Smith was a western Mountain Man. He began trapping animals in 1822. He explored more of the West than Lewis and Clark. Smith read his Bible and prayed each day. He didn't use tobacco or alcohol.

The Mountain Men and friendly Indians all met at a "Rendezvous" each year. They mostly traded animal furs. They also had a big party for everyone. The first four meetings were in Utah from 1825 to 1828.



Look at the two Mountain Men above. Draw a third Mountain Man and color all three. Check page 30 for a list of Rendezvous that your family can go to this year.




Utah's Cache Valley was a choice area for Mountain Men to hide or "cache" their furs and supplies.








Firm as the Mountains

Pioneer Beehive Biscuits



Pre-heat oven to 350° F. Stir together , baking powder, and in a medium bowl. Add the shortening. Blend with a fork until it looks like coarse crumbs. Set this bowl aside.

Put the egg and into another bowl and beat for 30 seconds. Pour this mixture into the first bowl. Stir about 1 minute until the dough is mixed. Put dough on a floured board. Knead gently 20 times. Roll out the dough to about ½ inch thickness.


Cut in circles about 2½ inches wide. Space evenly on a greased pan. Bake at 350° F until lightly browned. This will be about 10 to 14 minutes. This recipe makes about a dozen biscuits that look like small beehives. Fill them with and enjoy!



Try cooking Beehive Biscuits the way Mountain Men and Pioneers did. Use a Dutch Oven. If you don't know what one is, look closely at the Handcart Pioneer Monument on Temple Square.

Seagulls to the Rescue

The first Pioneers entered "The Valley" in 1847. The next year, they planted wheat, corn and other crops. Before harvest time, a swarm of crickets began eating the crops. The Pioneers would starve without a good harvest. One day, a vast flock of sea gulls came and began eating the crickets. Soon, they ate all the crickets. The sea gulls saved the Pioneers.








The sea gull is the Utah State bird. For a good reason, too!




Pioneer Settlements

By 1857, about 80,000 people had come to the place they called Deseret. Brigham Young sent them to all parts of the new land. Thousands of people soon followed the Pioneers to the West. By 1930, they built 725 towns in Utah and the nearby lands.

The Pioneers were the first people in North America to farm with irrigation canals. They raised crops and animals for a living. Cross out each animal that doesn't belong on a farm.







Life in those days was dangerous because of drought, flash floods and other trouble. In some towns, all the people moved away. Today, we call these places "Ghost Towns." Some old buildings are there, but the only people left are the ghosts of the Pioneers.

If you want to visit a Ghost Town, try Grafton near Zion N.P. Many movies, like "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid," were filmed there.






The Golden Spike






The Bonneville Speedway lies in the salt flats west of Salt Lake City. It is the site of auto speed records. Color the race cars below.









Happy Birthday to Utah


Below is a drawing of the Utah State seal. Some parts are missing. Find a Utah flag and look at it carefully. Then, complete the drawing and color it.

Hiking in Canyonland





Lost in the Deseret



Help Brion Zion find his car and his friends so they can cruise Utah.


